Professor Volokh teaches free speech law, copyright law, the law of government and religion, and a seminar on firearms regulation policy at the

University of California Los Angeles School of Law. While in attendance, he also provided his insight to the members of the Law Review regarding how to bring an article from draft form to publication. 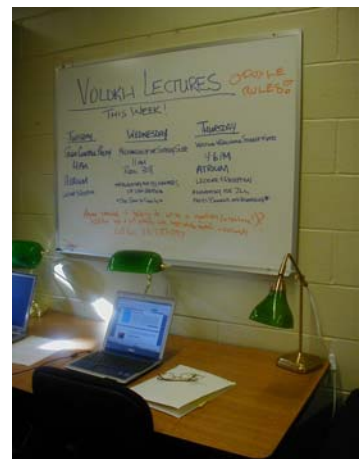

Amsterdam highlights Vol. 33, No. 2

The Hofstra Law Review is privileged to include Professor Anthony G. Amsterdam's remarks on the state of constitutional law in our next issue. Professor Amsterdam, of New York University School of Law, authored the article credited for initially conceptualizing the first amendment doctrine of over breadth. To this end, he has not only established himself as one of the nation's leading law

professors and advocates, but also as one of the most influential legal scholars of his generation. Professor Amsterdam recently honored Hofstra School of Law's own Eric M. Freedman with his remarks at the ceremony installing Professor Freedman as the Maurice A. Deane Distinguished Professor of Constitutional Law.
