Advancing the cutting edge of legal scholarship

Hofstra Law School invites you to the second annual Hofstra Colloquium on Law & Sexuality. The colloquium is designed to advance the cutting edge of scholarship on law and sexuality, particularly scholarship concerning the human rights of sexual minorities.

During the 2008-2009 academic year, seven scholars will present works-in-progress at the colloquium. Those works-in-progress will range in topic from marriage to employment discrimination, from critiques of current law to critiques of mainstream advocacy strategies. The colloquium will serve as both a platform for existing leaders in the field and as a venue for cultivating new talent.

The colloquium is an extension of Hofstra's established commitment to furthering the human rights of sexual minorities. In 2002, Hofstra developed an unprecedented fellowship program for law students dedicated to furthering lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender rights. Current fellows receive tuition assistance and summer stipends totaling up to \$75,000 per fellow. Together, the fellowship program and the colloquium make Hofstra a uniquely exciting place to study how the law constructs and regulates sexuality.

The colloquium presentations will be held at the Hofstra Law School, conveniently located close to New York City, in Hempstead, New York. Presentations will be held during lunch hour, and lunch will be served.
