Three competing themes permeate the law of criminal procedure: (1) protecting the public safety vs. protecting the rights of the individual; (2) legal tests based on a bright line rule vs. those using a case by case approach and (3) states' rights vs. national uniformity. In light of this and to aid our class discussion, please read *Bowles v. Russell*, 551 U.S. 205 (2007) and be prepared to discuss it in class. It would be helpful if you formally brief it.
